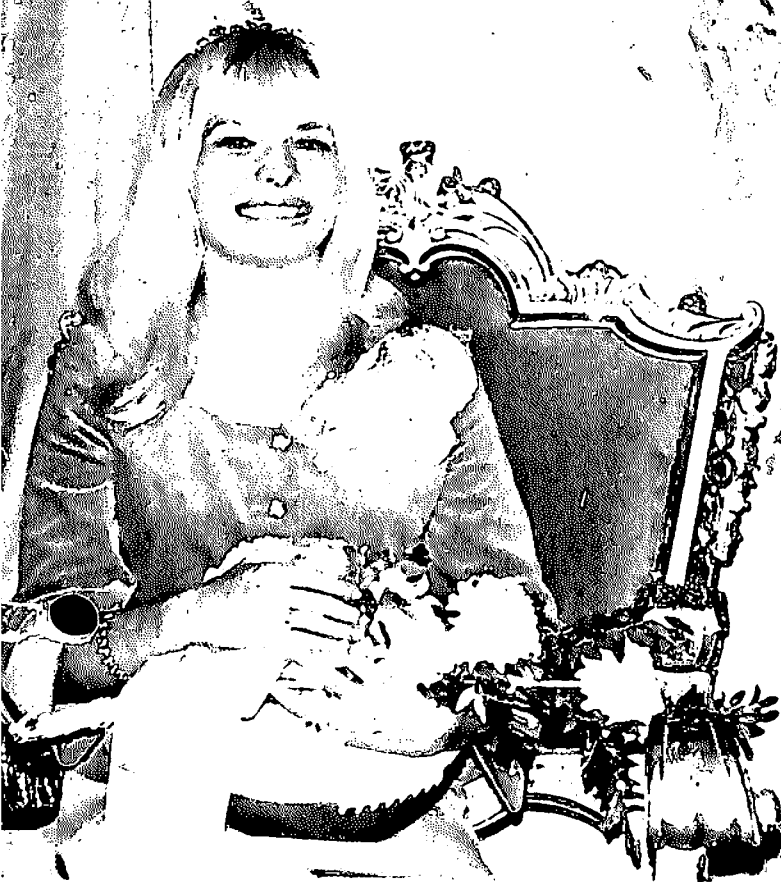

A lot of work. As a few Juniors work on their float, the others dream about their place in the float contest.

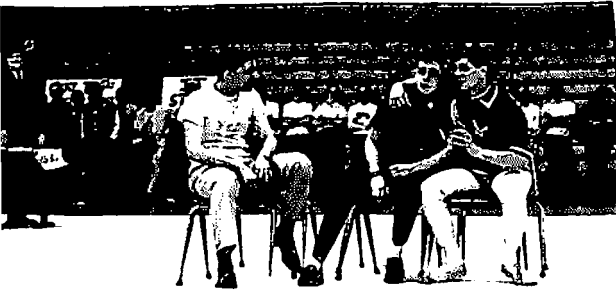




Frosh rush. Freshmen hurriedly put the last minute touches on their second float on the eve of the parade.



And all that work. A few Sophmores sacrifice a Saturday while they stuff their way into a third place finish.



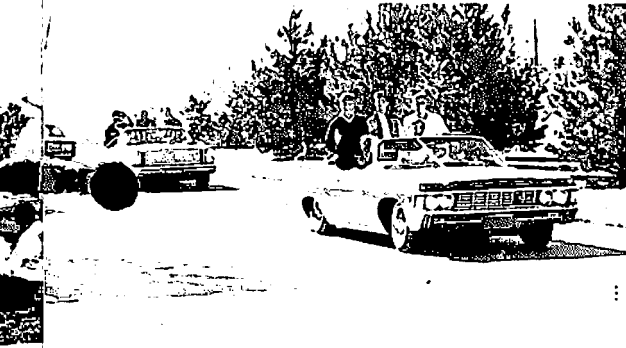

Pep talk. Coach Loeffelholz starts the homecoming activities with his talk to the players, students, and queen candidates at the Friday pep rally.



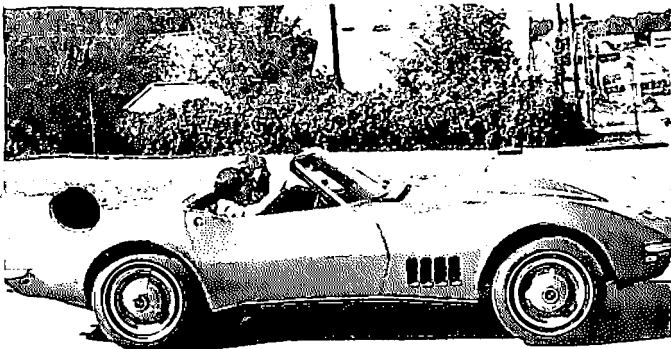
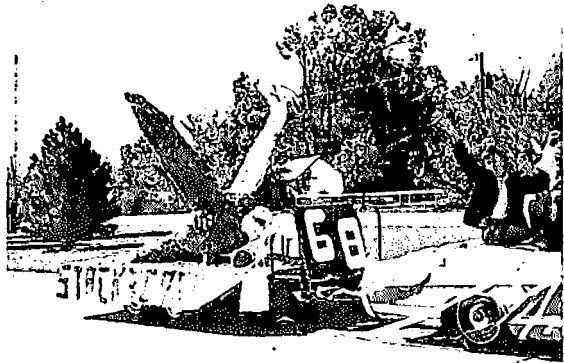

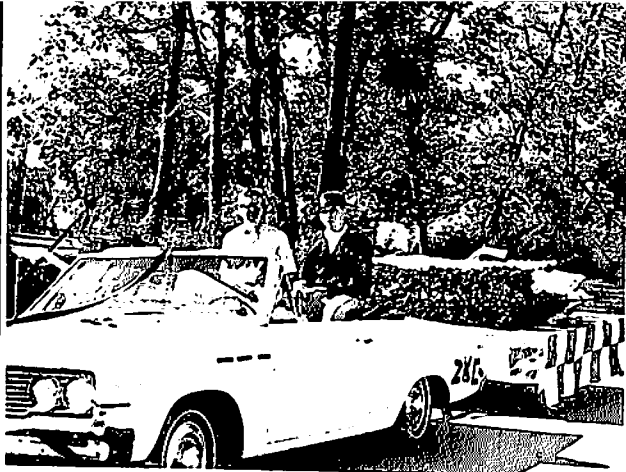

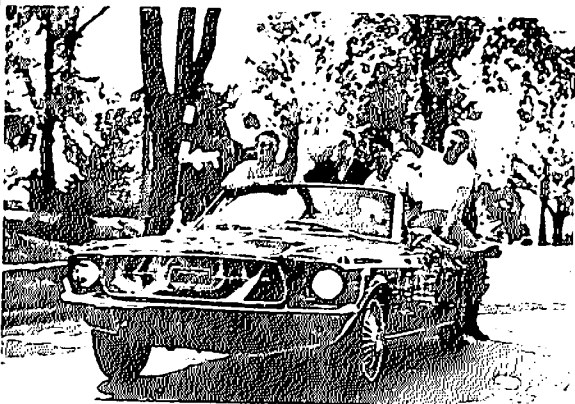


One of the antiques. Escort Howard Manning and his date Kris Haedel pause during a lag in the parade in their '68 Corvette.

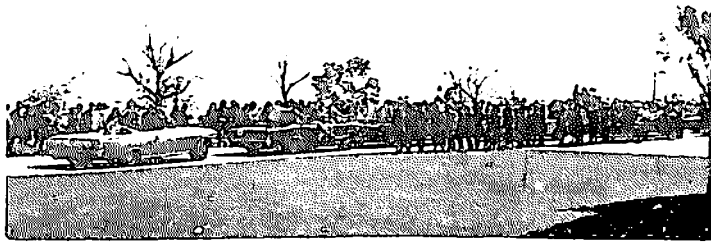

Last but not least. Mr. McCabe, S.J., and a group of Freshmen with their second entry brought up the rear of the Homecoming parade.



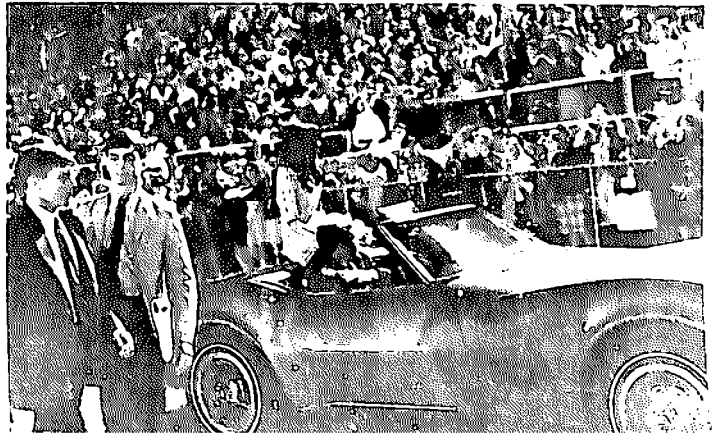
Stand in line girls! As jumping and yelling Rockhurst students ride through Loretto the girls greet them with open eyes.

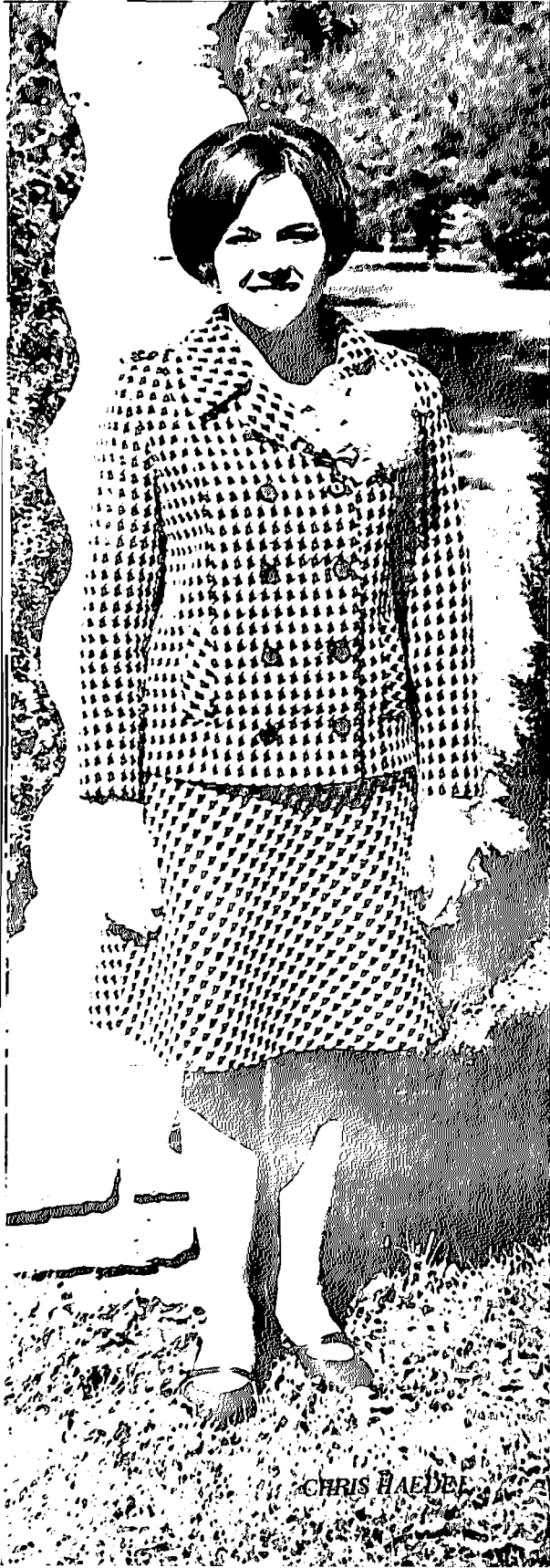


Sophs a float. Sophs bugalooing their way into third place with their masterpiece, whoop it up in the parade.

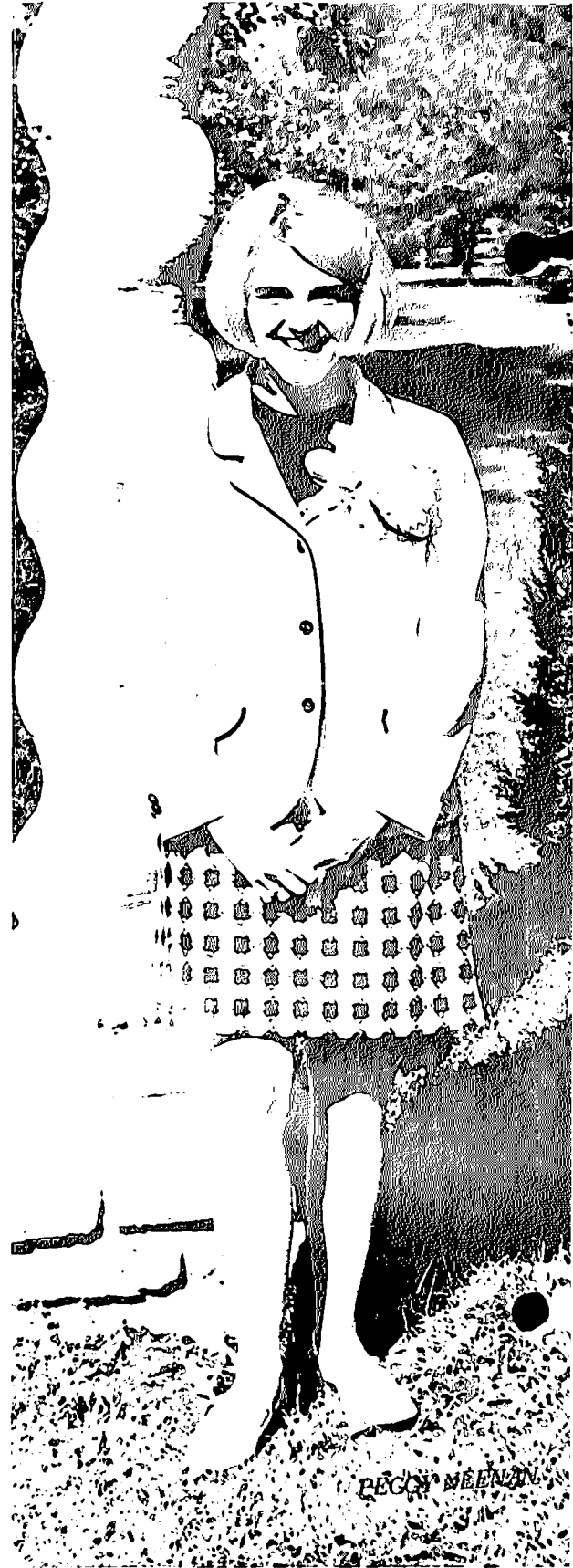

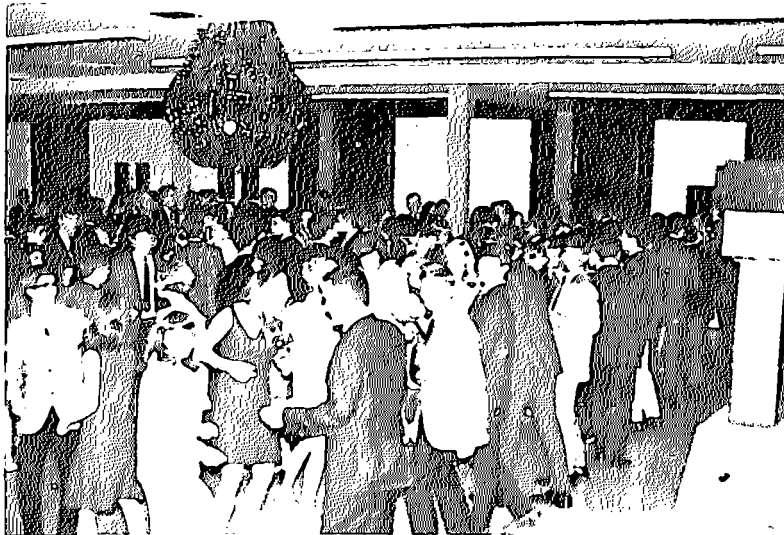
Guiding light. Father Piricelli suggests the best way to set up dance decorations to Senior Fred Nicholson and Juniors John Charmley and Jim Mellody.

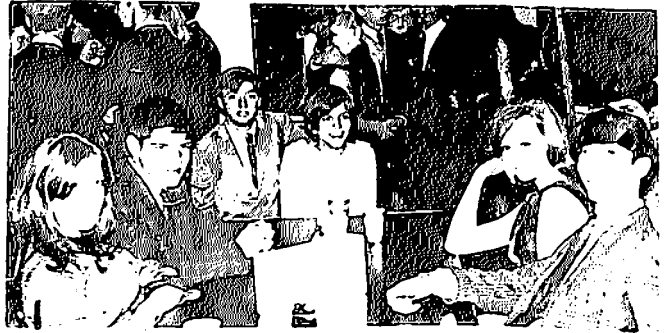

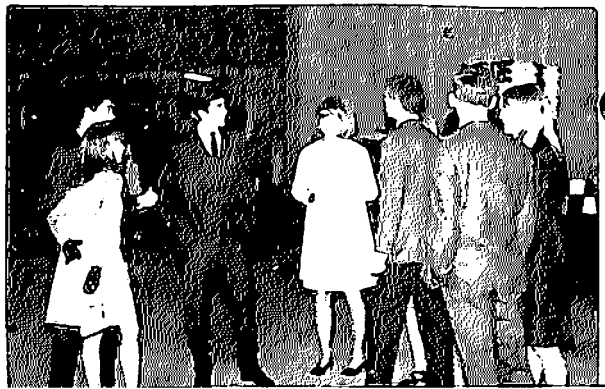

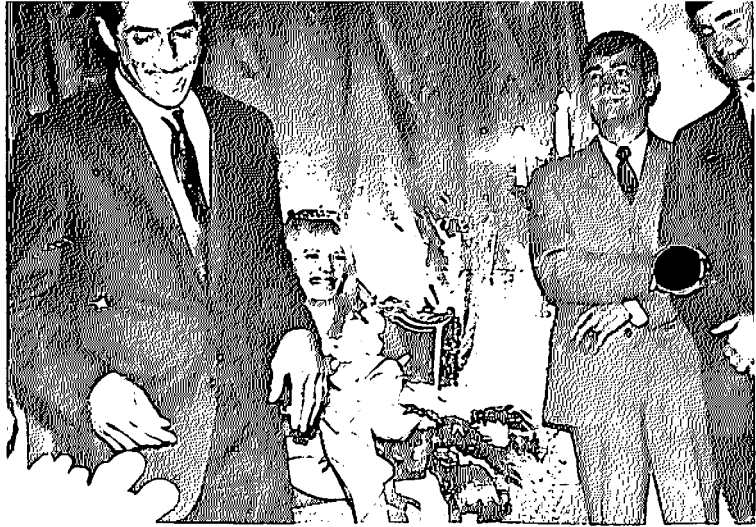

Queen for a day. Tears fill the eyes of Ginny Gibson as Jim Guberra crowns her Queen of the 1967 Homecoming Dance.



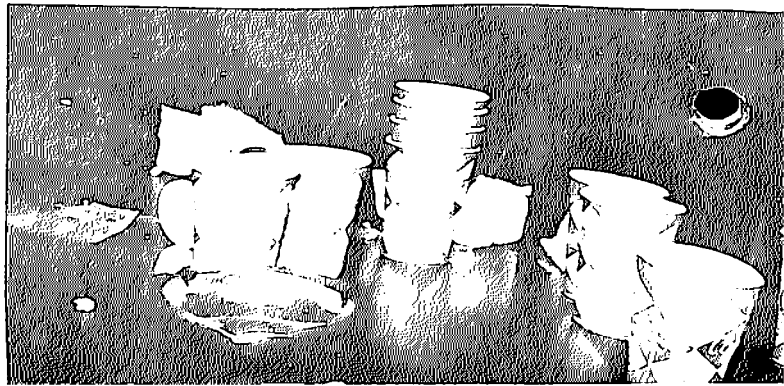
